Crossing the Red Sea

MEMORY VERSE: "Fear not, stand firm, and see the salvation of the Lord" Exodus 14:13

SCRIPTURES: Exodus 12:37-51; 13;17-22; 14

AIM: To teach that The Lord is my strength, in Battle.

God wanted to show His power and Glory to His people, and all of Egypt by saving the Israelites from slavery. Pharaoh, the king of Egypt, was stubborn. God had a way to make Pharaoh let the Israelites leave their slavery. One night the first born child in every family died.
