Lesson 100 Summary of the Old Testament: God is Love

Verse: In your unfailing love you will lead the people you have redeemed. In your strength you will guide them to your holy dwelling. Exo 15:13

God's Love in Creation

In the beginning, God's love poured forth into creation. The universe, filled with light, beauty, and life, reflected His goodness. He formed humanity in His image, breathing life into Adam and Eve, walking with them in perfect relationship. Even when they disobeyed, His love remained steadfast—He clothed them and promised redemption (Genesis 3:21, 15).

God's Gracious Covenant with Noah

Despite humanity's corruption, God's love preserved life. He spared Noah and his family, sealing His mercy with a rainbow as a covenant that He would never again destroy the earth by flood (Genesis 9:11-17).

The Call of Abraham

Deliverance from Egypt

Faithfulness During the Judges

Even as Israel repeatedly turned to idols, God's love raised up judges to deliver them from oppression. His patience and mercy shone as He worked to restore them to Himself (Judges 2:16).

The Kings and Prophets

Through David, God revealed His heart for a shepherd-king, promising an eternal kingdom (2 Samuel 7:16). When the kings faltered and led Israel astray, God's love spoke through prophets, calling His people to return to Him. He promised a new covenant written on their hearts (Jeremiah 31:31-34), and a suffering servant who would bear their sins (Isaiah 53).

God's Love in Exile and Return

Even in exile, God's love never abandoned His people. He gave hope through prophets like Daniel and Ezekiel, promising restoration. When the time came, He stirred the heart of Cyrus to allow His people to return and rebuild the temple (Ezra 1:1-3), showing His faithfulness to His promises.

Through every covenant, every deliverance, and every promise, God's love pointed toward something greater—a Messiah who would fulfill the Law, bring salvation to all nations, and restore the relationship broken in Eden.
