Learning At Home

Bible Study:

Read John 3:1-21. In this short, yet profoundly important text, Jesus explains the doctrine of regeneration to Nicodemus. This is quite interesting, because Nicodemus thought he was just coming to find out who this Jesus guy is. And Jesus' reply was in effect "With a sinful heart, you can't know the answer." So Jesus describes the process of the Holy Spirit doing a work in the soul of humans, enabling us to see our sinfulness and peril, and to behold the beauty of the Savior so that we can truly praise and worship him again.

The doctrine of regeneration is described throughout the Scriptures. The Old Testament describes it as circumcising and softening otherwise unholy and hardened hearts (Deut. 30:6; Ezek. 36:26). It is also portrayed as the act of God's writing his law on the human heart (Jer. 31:33). In the New Testament, it is represented as becoming a new creation (2 Cor. 5:17), being brought from death to life (Rom. 6:13), being called out of darkness into God's wonderful light (1 Pet. 2:9), or being born again (John 3:3).

The gospel in the story: In Jesus' conversation with Nicodemus, Jesus summarizes the end result of regernation in verse 16, which the Protestant reformer Martin Luther called "the gospel in miniature." Max Lucado wrote: "John 3:16, is a twenty-six word parade of hope: beginning with God, ending with Life, and urging us to do the same."
